**FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK**

**New Language**

By now, you all know there is a third vaccine in the fight against Covid-19. Yea! In record time, the industry that normally takes years to develop vaccines has come up with safe and effective ways to help reduce the instance of moderate to severe illness due to Covid-19. This is expected to drastically reduce the number of hospitalizations and deaths from this pesky bug. Due to the fact that nearly 53,000,000 Americans have been infected and subsequently have developed anti-bodies AND that nearly 25,000,000 have completed a course of vaccines, we have a third of our population protected! Another yea! By the end of March, we may have half of the population protected. That is great news for ALL of us. We know that some are reluctant to have the vaccine. If you are one of them, please talk to someone who has had them. They will be able to give you an eyewitness account as to the adverse effects. I am very anxious for the vaccine to be made available to anyone who wants it. I myself am in a place of limbo. My status is such that I will be dead last to get the vaccine. It is a way we can affirm that Christianity can be involved in relevant ways and contribute to the care for all of God's creatures. ***ENDOWMENT TEAM – Bil Tucker, Chair***



The Endowment Team is now at full strength with the additions of Olin Lyons in late 2020, Carolyn Kvam-Hansman this month and me last month.

At the February Leadership Team meeting, the LT approved the amount of up to \$15,800 of Endowment Fund earnings for distribution during 2021. Our first request for assistance in 2021 was received just over a week ago and is being reviewed at this time. ## **SCHOLARSHIP TEAM – Kathy Frantish, Chair**

29 applications have been received from Charlotte High School and Pt. Charlotte High. Reference forms have been sent to all named on the application. The team will be reviewing these based on needs and not academic scores. Once the list is reviewed the interview process will begin, and the \$8000 we currently have will be distributed. March will be a very busy time for the team, as April is when the scholarships are rewarded to seniors.

Congregants are welcome to contribute to this fund at any time. Checks can be sent to the church office, and please denote on them that they are for the Scholarship Fund. They will be added to your yearly donations.

## **TREASURER'S REPORT – Mike Robinson**

Through February, operating income for the church has totaled \$ 26,395. Our targeted budget for the year is \$181,639, an increase of \$14,609 over last year's actual receipts of \$ 167,030. If we annualize February year-to-date ( $\$ 26,395 \times 6 = \$ 158,370$ ) at the current level we are experiencing of receipts, we will end the year with an operating deficit of some \$ 23,000 ( $\$ 181,639 - \$ 158,370$ ). If this trend continues it will become increasingly worrisome.

We are exploring other insurance companies and income possibilities.

## **DISCIPLESHIP MINISTRY – Isaac James, Chair**



Hard to believe we are already coming upon Easter! Holy week preparations are underway...a mini version of the choir has been assembled for Palm Sunday and Easter. **MUSIC DIRECTOR – Isaac James**

“As Jesus was walking along, he saw a man . . . and he said to him, 'Follow me.' ” (Matt. 9:9)

She could not believe the cold, hard facts. The prognosis of her disease was eventual paralysis. Born in Clapham, England, in 1789, Charlotte Elliott had experienced an active and normal life for thirty years, so the verdict about her future resulted in a very despondent and frustrated young woman. As the months grew into years, her frustrations grew into anger. Why would God allow such a thing to happen?

But one day, in 1822, a very special visitor came to the family home. The well-known Swiss evangelist, Caesar Malan, sat by her bedside. Seeking his wise counsel, Charlotte explained her

hopelessness and despair. The question that got to the source of her anguish was "You speak of coming to Jesus, but how? I'm not fit to come."

Malan patiently explained the all-knowing, but all-forgiving and loving Savior. He told Charlotte that Jesus spoke of himself as the bread of life; that whoever comes to him will not hunger (John 6:35). As they prayed, she recognized her hungers. She wanted freedom from the depression that plagued her. She longed for peace and hope in her circumstances. It was a relief to say "Yes" to the simple request of Jesus: "Follow me."

The immediate change in her attitude was lasting. Each year she celebrated that day as the beginning of her new life— her spiritual birthday. On such a birthday in 1834, she captured her new insight on paper in the poem "Just As I Am." It expressed her "formula of faith" as she lovingly explained it to others. The music for her poem was later composed by American gospel musician William Bradbury.

For the remainder of her life, poetry was an expressive witness of her Christian faith. There were more than a hundred poems published in *The Invalid's Hymnbook*. Profits from its sales built a school for needy children. The director of the school, who was her brother and a minister, said: "In the course of my work, I hope to see some fruit of my ministry. But I feel more has been done by the single poem of my sister, 'Just As I Am.'

Could it be that one little poem touched more lives than many sermons or a school for needy children? It would not seem possible. But multiplication can be a miracle in God's plan. After Charlotte's death at age eighty-two, more than a thousand letters were discovered in her papers from people around the world, expressing thankfulness that their lives had been redirected by this one hymn.

Precious Lamb of God, the call to follow you is exciting. You give more than this world could begin to offer. With our whole being, we come, we come. Amen.

Just as I am, without one plea,  
but that thy blood was shed for me,  
and that thou bidst me come to thee,  
O Lamb of God, I come, I come!

The quieter times of the COVID pandemic have allow us to reflect on how we have "walked the walk" of our mission statement. Here are some of the initiatives and actions our congregation (you!) have supported.*

*CUCC's members and social justice supporters have:*

- Contributed to the Coalition of Immokalee Workers for health protection of immigrant farm workers against COVID-19. Throughout the pandemic, farmworkers continue to provide resources farm to table.
- Supported the Blanchard House and participates in annual Martin Luther King Day breakfasts and celebrations, and served as readers for the annual Martin Luther King local school essay contest.
- Participated in the United Church of Christ's national program "Sacred Conversations to End Racism."
- Studied, discussed, and supported the Principles of the national Poor People's Campaign.
- Met with leaders of the Immokalee Fair Housing Alliance to learn about and support their affordable housing project in Immokalee.
- Coordinated Living the Questions presentations and conversations around environmental, health, and economic justice issues.
- Supported the Citizens Climate Lobby.
- Sponsored highly successful community forums with Nobel Prize winner Dr. Terry Root on caring for our environment in the U.S. and specifically in SW Florida.
- Participated in Punta Gorda police and clergy co-sponsored events.
- Joined in walks and rallies on behalf of ending gun violence.
- Kept in contact with school officials about the funding of local lunch programs.
- Continued contributions to support St. Vincent De Paul.
- Created and presented Social Justice Moments during worship services on topics like farmworker justice, equity versus equality, voter rights, racial justice, environmental care, and many more.
