FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

BE A BLESSING

Spending nearly a month in one chapter of the Bible can at once be daunting and illuminating. Much of the month of February we have been in the 5th chapter of the Gospel of Matthew. This is one of most well-known chapters in all of Scripture. It is commonly known as the Sermon on the Mount. At the start, is something we call the Beatitudes.

For twelve verses Jesus turns the world of his disciples on its head. He tells of blessing coming to those who mourn, who are poor in spirit, we seek righteousness, who are hungry, who are persecuted, etc. Those hearing these sayings would have thought he was naming the outcasts, those who were not favored in God's eyes. In that day, the rich and healthy were the blessed. It had worked that way for millennium. Instead Jesus names the undesirables and proclaims them blessed.

Jesus goes on the say that his followers are to be rich flavoring to those with whom they come into contact. They are the salt of the earth. Though them the world is preserved, healed, and tasty. He then tells them they are the light of the world, God's light. When we shine that light into the community, we glorify God, not ourselves. He tells his followers that he didn't come to abolish the Law, but to fulfill it.

The topics get a bit tougher beginning with the 21st verse. He addresses the Law concerning murder, adultery, and divorce. I was particularly struck when Jesus equated anger with murder. The teaching was that we should not offer our gifts to God if someone from the faith community has a charge against us. To me, Jesus was saying that anger between people of faith is possibly more damaging than murder and definitely a hindrance to offering God our best selves.

This is where I was stuck. Anger. Have we any pent-up anger? I might suggest that this is what I see most in the news and on the streets. Our society has become a place where violence, verbal and physical, is more valued than dialogue. A place where one opinion must overcome the other. It also dawned on me that Jesus was addressing the church in these comments. Could it be that we are missing an essential truth?

When I spoke of this portion of the Sermon on the mount in my message, I had in mind Jesus' comments about being salt and light. I feel there is a direct correlation to the destructiveness of anger that he was addressing and our call to be God's salt and light in the world. What are we being called to do?

Now I come back to the Beatitudes. It was not an accident that Matthew began this difficult chapter with the words of Jesus declaring blessing. The one that stands out to me is about the Peacemakers. Being a Peacemaker means taking the risk of standing between two warring parties and declaring that there is a better way. It means taking the risk of giving up being right to create peace. There must be a willingness to listen more than talk. There needs to be a heart of compassion for BOTH perspectives.

I have a quote on my phone by Indira Gandhi. It speaks to my heart about the position a healer and Peacemaker takes when standing in those roles. She once said, "You cannot shake hands with a closed fist." I am reminded of what we undertake at the beginning of each worship service, Passing of the Peace. We stroll around the sanctuary, greeting one another with all our salt and light showing. It is a good moment when we get to practice being Peacemakers. It is not a moment to say hello or good morning. It is a time we approach one another with open hand and heart to offer and receive Peace from one another. If anyone has a grievance with me, I offer us the chance to deal with it in a peaceful way. It is the way that enables us the chance to offer our gifts to God.

When we offer open hands to clasp, we cannot help but feel the warmth of the other. We cannot avoid the pulse that throbs through both bodies. We cannot deny our shared humanity. It is an intimate sharing of self with other.

Think about a topic that makes you most angry. Now think about the people that make you most angry. Now, think about holding their hand in Peace rather than anger. It does not mean we agree about anything other than finding our common humanity. It does not mean we agree with one another. It does not change our opinions. What it demands of us, however, is that we remember whose salt and light we are, that we are blessed in our call to be Peacemakers.

It is far more difficult to make peace with an enemy than a friend. Then again, we don't need to make Peace with friends, do we? Our country and democracy will not survive if we continue to have only enemies. Please don't let that be our reality or the legacy we hand to the next generations to suffer through. It is our job, now, to be the Peacemakers. Blessed are the Peacemakers for they will be called the children of God.



MODERATOR'S REPORT - Bill Colson

After an eventful January in the life of the church, February has been quiet (kinda sorta) If you have been watching to see what has occurred on the roof, you saw the roofer moved in quickly during February, completed the low roof in the rear of the church, and after the solar panels were removed, removed old shingles on the front roof, and replaced them with new ones. Harriman's Solar has replaced the solar panels. So, we will be generating electricity shortly. Thank you to the supporters of the Capital Campaign.

Look for Kathy Frantish's report in this Beacon for news of the Capital Campaign projects. The Leadership Team meeting on February 11th was mostly items from Old Business from past months. Briefly, they were as follows:

- Long term contract for Isaac James. The LT continues to discuss a proposed contract with him. I will report further when the discussion is completed.
- The need for a contract and agreement with Excaliber Services as to the scope of their services regarding cleaning of the sanctuary, restrooms, and stripping and waxing of floors was discussed. Three persons are to meet with the owner regarding omissions and services not performed. More on their performance later.
- The Leadership Team restated that all organizations and persons using the facilities of Congregational UCC are expected to sign a User Agreement, and abide by the terms it contains. As new persons/organizations come to the office to schedule use of the facilities, they are expected to sign the User Agreement.
- During discussions about various personnel matters, it was learned that the church has no codified or single collection of personnel policies that apply to non-ordained personnel employed by the church. A committee of four from the Leadership Team was appointed to collect and review existing policies, and to draft proposed policies were none now exist. They will report back to the Leadership Team in coming months.

Under new business, Bruce Nielson met with the Leadership Team to discuss a proposal. We have taken his proposal under advisement and will report our decision, most likely after the next Leadership Meeting.

The rest of the Leadership meeting was about the written reports received from the various standing committees and officers. They are summarized elsewhere in this issue of the Beacon.

The next meeting of the Leadership Team will occur on Tuesday, March 10th. 2020. If you the congregation have comments, critiques, or praise about any happenings in the life of the church, let us, the Leadership Team, know. We welcome your input.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN- Kathy Frantish, Chair

We are excited to announce the completion of our first project for the Capital Campaign. **Building our Legacy** is targeted for specific updates and improvements to our facilities that will allow us to embrace God's mission, faith and justice. Our new roof has been installed and the solar panels have been reinstalled. It looks great.

Our next projects will include the updates to our front entrance into the sanctuary and a new handicapped family bathroom. An architectural drawing of the new entrance is being drawn to present to the congregation, and we hope to have that within the next couple of weeks. Stay tuned! We currently have \$182,000 of the \$200,000 goal pledged, but we still have a few more dollars to raise in order to turn our last two leaves and achieve our total goal. Thank you to everyone who has given generously and remember that this is a new year and you may consider a 2020 tax deduction. Again, thank you for all the generous pledges we have received.

These are the financial results for January 2020. I am very pleased with the donations in January. Not only did they exceed budget, but they were up \$3,838 over January 2019, which was \$11,814. Thanks to all! Expenses in January were also less than budgeted, but compared to last year, were \$1,247 higher. January 2019 expenses were \$12,625.

February 2020 operating income is estimated to be in around \$29,700 compared to \$15,203 in 2019. This is a huge increase and can be attributed to some members paying their entire annual pledge in February (\$12,300). At this point we don't have final expense numbers, but February certainly will not be in the red!

Overall, I think this is a great start for what I anticipate is going to be a wonderful year in the life of our church.

If you would like an easy and cost-free way to contribute to the church, you can set up an automatic payment through your bank by using electronic banking. Payments are mailed from your bank to the church. MUSIC DIRECTOR – Isaac James

When I first arrived in Punta Gorda in December of 2018, I never thought that just over a year later I would have so many friends and church family. I really and truly cannot thank you all enough. I feel privileged to be here in the position I am. I'm just sitting here on a beautiful February day as I write this and am thankful. While I'm thankful, I can't help but be so

appreciative of the choir...they have grown in leaps and bounds, also, in numbers, I thank them for

trusting me with their beautiful instruments of voice. Our choir accompanist, Melissa Brown has put so much effort in giving us the beautiful arrangements for piano week after week, we wouldn't be able to do it without her.

This month's hymn story is of one of my favorite hymns of the passion, When I Survey the Wondrous Cross. Isaac Watts first published it in his Hymns and Spiritual Songs (1707). Designated a communion hymn, it appeared under the heading "Crucifixion to the World by the Cross of Christ; Gal. 6:14." One of the first English-language hymns to use the word "I" and to focus directly on personal religious experience, "When I Survey" holds an important place in the history of hymnody. It offers an example of how Watts, sometimes called the father of English hymnody, enlarged the boundaries of English sacred song beyond the metrical psalms to include freer verse that readily lent itself to new musical settings. Watts fused two traditions of sacred song that had been developing side-by-side-metrical psalms and hymns-in texts characterized by unusual clarity and force in the choice of words.

The son of a Congregationalist minister, Watts was born in 1674 in Southampton, England. He followed his father into the ministry, accepting appointment to Mark Lane Chapel in London in 1702. His health broke soon after, forcing Watts to retire from public life. Until his death in 1748, he fulfilled ministerial duties as possible and devoted much time to study and writing. His books gained him wide repute, but Watts regarded his hymns as his most enduring contribution to the church. "When I Survey" is generally cited as the best these, though others remain in use as well.

In its first publication in 1707, "When I Survey" had five stanzas. Its second line originally read "Where the young Prince of Glory died." In an enlarged edition of the hymnal in 1709, Watts changed the second line to the familiar "On which the Prince of Glory died" and offered the fourth stanza for optional use:

His dying Crimson, like a Robe,

Spreads o'er his Body on the Tree;

Then am I dead to all the Globe

And all the Globe is dead to me.

SOCIAL JUSTICE MINISTRY TEAM – Linda Weaver and M.E. Steele-Pierce

Have you noticed? Members of the Social Justice team demonstrate once a month at our local Wendy's fast food restaurant, as part of our economic justice ministry on behalf of the Fair Food Alliance. Why do this?

In 2018, 42 CUCC members visited the Coalition of Immokalee Workers, two hours south of us in Immokalee FL. There we about learned working conditions on Florida's tomato farms: low pay, long hours, few benefits, sexual harassment, racial discrimination, and even slavery. At the same time, we learned about the Coalition's 20-year fight as a worker-led human rights organization and their success in combating these ills.

Today, 14 major food retailers participate in their Fair Food Program. These retailers agree to purchase only from growers who meet a worker-designed Code of Conduct and a zero-tolerance policy for slavery, violence and child labor. Retailers also pay a "penny-per-pound" premium passed directly to farm workers. All major fast food companies participate in the Fair Food Program except for one—Wendy's.

We remember when Dave Thomas started the fast food chain Wendy's, named after his daughter, and the restaurant's family focus. Now, however, the chain is held by billionaire Nelson Peltz who values corporate profit over farmworker field conditions. He refuses to meet with representatives of the Fair Food Program.

This is why we join the United Church of Christ, the Alliance for Fair Food and the Student Farmworker Alliance to demonstrate.

The following retailers SUPPORT the Coalition of Immokalee Workers and the Fair Food Program: Taco Bell, KFC, McDonalds, Pizza Hut, Burger King, Chipotle, Subway, Whole Foods, Fresh Market, Trader Joes, and Walmart.
