FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

LEFTOVERS

I grew up in a rural household in Vermont with seven mouths to feed. My parents were not wealthy by any means, but we never lacked for any necessity. That included food. If we didn't grow it, slaughter it, or hunt it, we didn't have it. We were farmers with a modest size milking herd of sixty Holsteins (the ONLY cow to milk as far as my father was concerned). We had a garden the size of our grass parking lot at church. We had chickens for eggs and meat. We had pigs and rabbits for variation of our meat diet. We lived very well. However, with seven mouths to feed three times a day, we never threw away food. We had leftovers.

I'm thinking of these as I prepared my famous (well, at least in my own mind) ham and lentil soup. I do variations of this soup, depending on the holiday. Twice a year I make turkey and lentil soup. For Easter, we have ham for our celebratory meal after church. Thus, we also have ham and lentil soup for several days after.

My mother's fridge would be filled with leftovers. She would, somehow, gather empty Cool Whip containers to store her leftovers in. This was slightly miraculous considering that we NEVER used Cool Whip in our house. But there they were, filling every spare space on every shelf in the fridge.

Now, this used to drive my Dad crazy, not because he didn't like leftovers, but because he couldn't SEE what was in the containers. He was forced to lift the lid of each one to find out what was inside. My mother knew what each one contained, but never shared that with her family. At times, my Dad would open one that had a very aromatic leftover inside and he'd slam the lid shut, mutter a profanity, and put it back onto the shelf where he got it from. I could almost swear, at times, that I saw a smile cross my Mom's face when he would encounter one of those leftovers. It didn't get any better when my Mom discovered Tupperware. My Mom had Tupperware in her cupboards that was so old it "groaned" instead of "burped" when the air was let out!

I grew up on leftovers. Whenever we had a pot roast, say, we could count on eating that roast for at least three days following. Often, we would have it in soup or hash or in sandwiches on a Sunday after church. Needless to say, my Mom had to be fairly inventive in how she used those leftovers. If we saw the same dish more than once, there would be resistance. Holiday times were the best. We would have turkey or ham variations for what seemed a week and I never get tired of it.

When my Mom passed away, it took my Dad nearly a month to rid the fridge of all of those Cool Whip containers. He knew he shouldn't open them, but he sometimes did. Instead of profanity I would hear a muttered, "Oh that's where that went." as he chucked it into the trash. He did so reluctantly, because each time he did, he was letting a little more of my Mom go.

It took me some maturity to learn one of the reasons I torture my family with leftovers. It isn't only the desire to not waste food (sadly, something our culture relishes doing, throwing away food I mean), but those leftovers are memories of times share together around a table. There would usually be stories and jokes told that were saved for "special" occasions. There was laughter and some tears shed when we remembered loved ones who were no longer with us for those special occasions.

I sit here glowing in the times we have shared together in the past few months. I relish the leftovers we have from our time together this year. When we decorated the sanctuary to usher in another Advent. How we managed to have yet another Pageant that still feels fresh. Of another Annual Meeting, where a near record time was achieved! Another Ash Wednesday where we might have left the service and actually let people see the cross emblazoned on our forehead or hand. A benefit concert. Lenten Bilby Study. Palm Sunday, with thirteen new mouths to feed ;) Maundy Thursday around the table for food and Communion. The Good Friday showing of the Passion. Decorating the cross with flowers. A truly gifted Easter Worship service with music galore!

All of these joined experiences are saved to bring out and sample now and then. The best part is that they never wear out or spoil! We can dine on them for as long as those memories withstand the passing of time.

I have come to realize that our remembering of Jesus is the same. I am catching onto the fact that; it is in remembering that the Resurrection is real. For me there doesn't need to be a testimony that there was a bodily Resurrection, though there are stories of an altered form of Jesus visiting the disciples. There doesn't need to be the controversy around, if there isn't a body then there wasn't a Resurrection. There are sightings of Jesus around us still every day, each time we remember his teachings and try to live as disciples. I think those are Resurrection moments and just as real today as two thousand years ago.

One of my favorite leftovers this year is when Jesus sits with his friends at a meal and when the meal is over, he blesses bread and cup, shares it with his friends and tells them to REMEMBER every time they are together what he tried to teach them about God and faith, how they are to love one another and those around them, how to serve God before themselves. I have the chance to pull that one out any time I think that memory is fading and renew it.

My friends, remember the life and ministry of Jesus. Savor its unique composition. Live with purpose. Share your leftovers with all whom you meet. Easter Blessings to you all!

Your Leadership Team was busy during April.

Buckley's Pass

After the Congregational Meeting March 31st, Pastor Mike and I negotiated on behalf of our Congregation, with the City Manager of Punta Gorda, regarding the assessment terms and payment schedule. We finally agreed to pay the assessment over a ten-year term, with no interest to accrue during that period. After the City Council's approval of the Buckley's Pass project on April 3rd, a Public Hearing was held, with several Church Members present, and offering comments.

My thanks to everyone who attended the Council Meeting, and those who spoke in support of the Congregational UCC. The contract with the City of Punta Gorda regarding repayment of the assessment, and the terms, was signed April 10th.

Hearing Loop

The Hearing Loop was installed at the end of March and is in service now. It was greatly appreciated by several choir members during the Easter Service, and the choir's performance of the Hallelujah Chorus. It was noticed and appreciated by those attending Dr. Terry Root's presentation about The Impact of Plastics on Wildlife. Thank you to everyone who pledged and contributed funds for the Hearing Loop installation. Please notice the signage of a Hearing Loop installation on each door leading into the Sanctuary, the notification slides during the Sunday morning announcements, and the notice on the Home Page of our Website. The system is paid for, and the grant for partial reimbursement has been sent to the Grantor.

I have demonstrated the Hearing Loop performance to two interested outside parties: a nearby church, and my Home Owner's Association Board Member.

Leadership Team Meeting

The entire Leadership Team is very aware of the condition of our building. A large portion of April's meeting was spent discussing pending repairs and the proposed costs. The repairs to building components covered by stucco are proceeding. Water damage beneath the stucco was greater than expected. Because of dissatisfaction with repairs to our roof on the rear additions, Boyette-Miller Construction was contacted seeking a coordinated approach to repairs impacting the siding/fascia, the roof and stucco interface. Upon their inspection of the affected areas, they prepared a proposal for immediate remediation of the stucco, roof and siding interface. Stucco repairs will pause a few days so that a series of flashings can be installed to prevent water infiltration beneath the stucco and walls.

Boyette-Miller will prepare a set of estimates for replacement and/or repair of the siding and fascia around the building. Their roofer will prepare an estimate of any immediate roofing repairs, and the projected remaining useful life of the east and west roof areas.

If you are heading north for the season, consider contributing throughout the summer as well, either by direct deposit (see below) or sending a monthly or weekly donation.

If you would like an easy and cost-free way to contribute to the church, you can set up an automatic payment through your bank by using electronic banking. Payments are mailed from your bank to the church. Most banks do not charge for this service—not even for the postage to mail the payment.

SOCIAL JUSTICE MINISTRY REPORT – M.E. Steele Pierce and Glenn Weaver

Environmental Justice Dr. Terry Root gave us numerous helpful strategies for reducing our use of plastic: throw out your sea salt, remember to take your cloth bags to the store, turn down plastic straws, use water bottles that aren't made



from plastic, get biodegradable garbage bags-to name a few easy ones to remember and use! She also documented the horrible destruction to the environment and death to oceanic wildlife from the dramatic accumulation of waste plastics in the world.

Immigration Justice-Over 20 members attended the play “Refugee” at North Ft. Myers Academy of the Arts. A big, sincere thank you to Ana Rivadeneira for making this possible. This play and book certainly help us to empathize with refugee families-especially the children!! Thank you for opening our eyes and hearts!

Social Justice Bookshelf- The book, *The Devil in the Grove:Thurgood Marshall, the Groveland Boys, and the Dawn of a New America* by Gilbert King, has been donated to our library. Here is a short summary by member, Bruce Nielsen. **Devil in the Grove is the true story of how white, southern, citrus farmers went to extremes to maintain an African American work force in virtual slavery.** In 1949, a 17-year-old, white, Florida girl accused four African-Americans of having raped her. (It would have been impossible for the events to have transpired as she or the state's sheriff testified.) But southern, white men weren't interested in justice, they only sought the death of the African American men they thought had deflowered a southern, white woman (and to intimidate other African American men who might have thoughts about leaving the citrus fields of Florida). Future Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall, of the NAACP's Legal Defense Fund (at personal risk) led the defense of the accused men.
