**FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK**

Synod 33 Reflections by Rev. Michael Ford, Delegate

I have an assignment. In 200 words or less, describe my reflections on General Synod 33! Wow, what a challenge! This was my third Synod as a delegate, but it was by far the most interesting for me. The virtual format allowed me to visit more workshops and Optional Events than I could have in person. I have to admit, the virtual format was also more challenging. Since we were at home, our regular lives were lived, and ministry was done. It sure was nice to sleep in my own bed every night but being in a virtual room until late into the evening was exhausting. I am hoping that there will be a hybrid experience in the future. The in-person format was intense, but time is limited. I felt like a kid in a candy shop being able to partake of more content!

And what content there was. I expect worship at Synod to be extraordinary and unique, but this was over the top. Worship was pre-recorded by professional film crews, so the presentation was exquisite, but that's not what blew me away. I was taken on an adventure, experiencing traditions I have only heard of but not experienced. The music and visuals took brought me into the center of the spiritual nature of our home plant. Indigenous singers and dancers wove the message of care of earth I could not have begun to imagine. I even heard an Indigenous rapper who danced in native attire while offering prayer! This was mixed with choirs that I have heard all my life. We were teased into a combination of traditions blurred together effortlessly and all of it inspiring. Our preachers were the kind that have you on the edge of your seat or shouting AMEN! All of the time.

Our keynote speakers have given me sustenance for a thousand sermons. I was awed by Valerie Kaur. I have seen her before, but this time she spoke to me directly, sitting in her house, engaging the camera as though we sat across a table over a cup of coffee. What stick with me first and which I have dwelt upon since is that she proclaimed that the darkness we are experiencing can represent two things, either the tomb or the womb. She led us along the path of the tomb and all of

the dangerous rhetoric of today and where that takes us. Then she said that we are in a place of birth, that a new world is ready to be born from love, radical love.

Adam Russell Taylor, the new Executive Director of the Sojourners organization, inspired us with, and I quote from the UCC News, “urged “beloved community” as an antidote to the “twin viruses” of “systemic racism and toxic polarization.” Adam comes to Sojourners from of all places, the World Bank. He was an advisor to the Bank of the ethical use of monetary resources, among other faith aspects of money. He is definitely a rising star in the leadership of that new world that Valerie envisioned. Some exciting futures were spoken of, and listeners were challenged to become part of those futures.

The business, well let’s say it was not without controversy. For the first time I saw a defeated resolution brought back to the floor by the people who voted against it! It dealt with the occupation and colonizing of the Hawaiian nation by the Christian Missionaries sent by the UCC (before the UCC existed of course). It was almost totally rewritten but was found to not represent the views of all the native Hawaiian populations. It was realized that furthering the conversation was the path forward and it passed on the second vote. Now the harder work begins of implementation. We’ll see if the UN takes notice.

Suffice it to say that my Synod experience was exceptional. I can’t wait to pour over the recorded speakers and worship to glean further insights on how to become that Beloved Community birthed in uncertain times. Thanks for sending me!

### ***ENDOWMENT TEAM – Bil Tucker, Chair***



Recommendations from the Endowment Team regarding distribution of Endowment Funds were approved by the Leadership Team.

### ***TREASURER’S REPORT – Michael Robinson, Treasurer***



Through July we are in good shape financially with an unspent (but committed) \$ 51,097 in capital funds (earmarked for a bathroom renovation) and \$ 40,162 in our operating account, of which some \$ 9,000 is earmarked for Social Justice and Scholarships, leaving \$ 31,000 for operating expenses.

However, donations in July took a \$ 2,100 hit compared to June. Note to Snowbirds: Our expenses continue even while you are cooling off up North.

Please remember to send in your pledges.

Expenses continue to come in below budget through June, running some \$ 6,300 under budget.

On a personal note, it sure feels good to be home after our 6 ½ week sojourn to NY and ME and points in between—15 stops up and down with family and friends. It was sad, however, to be confronted once again with the scourge of Covid, which has now struck so close to home. We were so looking forward to worshipping at our church once again only to learn that the virus had infected one of our own, we were back to virtual services....and that Florida is now a “hot spot.” However, we must remain positive in outlook. We *will* come out of this.

**MUSIC DIRECTOR – Isaac James**

It is an unfortunate turn of events when a young boy is forced to grow up without a loving father. Thus was Robert Robinson's fate. His dad passed away when he was only eight years of age. Robert was born on Sept. 27, 1735, to Mary Wilkin and Michael Robinson, a customs officer, in Swaffam in the county of Norfolk, a market town and civil parish in the English countryside.

To make Roberts circumstances much more difficult, his maternal grandfather, Robert Wilkin, a wealthy man, who had never reconciled himself to his daughter's lowly marriage, disinherited his grandson and provided an inheritance for him of only ten shillings and sixpence.

As soon as Robert was old enough, he secured a job as an apprentice to a barber. Even in his youth he endured the hardship of having to be the breadwinner for his widowed mother and himself. His formal education was limited. However, his knowledge was varied and extensive because he spent many hours in study. There was an adult-like quality deeply ingrained in him, and it allowed him to accept the responsibilities of adulthood, even as a teenager.

As he grew older, he came under the influence of the famed evangelist, George Whitfield. On Dec. 10, 1755, Robinson could not push from his mind a particular phrase used by Mr. Whitfield in one of his sermons: "Oh, my hearers! the wrath to come! the wrath to come!" He was wondrously converted and became a minister of the gospel; first, in a Baptist church, then in a Methodist church, and later in other denominations.

In one location his congregation grew to 1,000 in attendance.

Unfortunately, and for some unexplained reason, he became altogether unstable and unhappy. His Christian beliefs and training seemed of little importance to him.

On one occasion, years later, he found himself the fellow passenger of a young lady on a stagecoach. It is reported that she began to sing to break the monotony of the trip. And what did she sing?

*Come, thou fount of every blessing, tune my heart to sing thy grace.  
Streams of mercy, never ceasing, call for songs of loudest praise.  
Teach me some melodious sonnet sung by flaming tongues above.  
Praise the mount, I'm fixed upon it, mount of thy redeeming love.  
Here I raise my Ebenezer, hither by thy help I come,  
And I hope by thy good pleasure safely to arrive at home.  
Prone to wander, Lord, I feel it, prone to leave the God I love.  
Here's my heart, O take and seal it, seal it for thy courts above.  
Jesus sought me when a stranger wandering from the fold of God.  
He, to rescue me from danger, interposed His precious blood.

## **Environmental Justice- A Creation Justice Church**

Our SJMT has been learning about Creation Justice churches in our UCC denomination. Saving our environment is at a critical point in our planet Earth’s history and UCC churches are seeking God’s calling. We would like to let you know the process we have been studying.

### **WHAT are Creation Justice Churches?**

Churches which have committed to a process of discerning ways to best care for God’s creation.

### **HOW do we become a Creation Justice Church?**

Our UCC denomination has a 5-step process for churches to follow. A Creation Care Covenant is developed by each individual church.

### **WHY should we do this?** To quote the UCC website:

- “1.It’s our first calling!
2. It’s what Jesus would do!
3. Clean air, clean water, preserving the creation—those are good things!
4. It’s about justice - relationships of love and care for all God has made!
5. It’s in our denomination’s DNA!”
