FEAR OF THE DIVINE

The Gospel of Mark moves very quickly. In the beginnings of the first chapter we are introduced to John the Baptizer. Jesus is baptized with the Spirit descending as a dove to light on him and a voice from the heavens proclaiming Jesus as a beloved son. The Spirit whisks Jesus into the desert to face temptation by evil for forty days. Jesus reappears in Galilee and begins calling disciples. All of this happens in the first twenty verses of chapter one!

This past Sunday we encountered, in scripture, Jesus teaching in the synagogue encountering a man with an unclean spirit (Mark 1:21-28). As the story unfolds, since it was the Sabbath, Jesus attends worship. Seemingly uninvited, he steps into the role of teacher. The people are amazed (can also be translated frightened) at his teachings because he doesn't give a sermon like that of the scribes. He preaches a sermon that provokes.

In the middle of this experience, immediately as the story goes, a man with an unclean spirit rises and shouts at Jesus, "What do you want with *us*, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy *us*? I know who you are, the Holy One of God!" What is intriguing to me is that the reference to the unclean spirit is *plural*. This man is not afflicted with an unclean spirit. He is set upon by *many* unclean spirits.

Mark does not tell us what Jesus preached. However, we know from the Gospel that it was enough to draw out of hiding a multitude of very bad things from this man. What a powerful lesson it must have been! It is a little frustrating that Mark doesn't arm us with Jesus' words, but then again maybe it's better that he doesn't. Perhaps then it would become a "formula" to apply by rote to anyone WE deem as being inhabited by "unclean spirits" i.e. different? We know from the Gospels that Jesus preached freedom and healing for the oppressed and poor. For that, he was nearly killed.

Several aspects of this encounter speak to me. First, I have already noted that the man was possessed by many spirits. His suffering under this load must have been excruciatingly painful. I wonder, how often did this man come to church waiting for a provocative sermon to free him of this affliction? Perhaps he sat there for years. Possibly the people around him knew; perhaps they didn't. These unclean spirits might have had him put on a good face in public but saved the torment for private times. Perhaps he lost his family, his job, his community to them. He obviously needed relief.

The next aspect intriguing to me is that the unclean spirits *know* who Jesus is. In fact, they name him as the Holy One of God. In the Gospel of Mark Jesus has four encounters with unclean spirits that give his identity. I hypothesize that these unclean spirits know Jesus because they have already met him in the wilderness and he remembers them. Jesus remembers how they were defeated then, and they *know* he can do it again!

The most important factor for me in this encounter is that Jesus does not hesitate to silence the voices of the spirits but to cast them out as well. This is something no one else seemed to be able to do before. For as long as the man might have been present in the worship setting, he didn't get what he needed until Jesus came to town. He takes action. He doesn't wait until the leadership decides what to do about the man with the unclean spirits. I suspect their reaction would have been to kick him out of church. (3)

Probably the thing that fascinates me most in this passage is the reaction of the people who witnessed the event. They were amazed (can also be translated as frightened) at the power of his teaching. They were accustomed to the scribes reciting the law and extolling the people to follow it to the letter in order to be righteous before God. But Jesus? He brought something extra to those teachings, something that amazed and scared the people who were there.

The clincher comes next. In verse 27 the people remark, "What is this? A new teaching, and with authority! He even gives orders to evil spirits, and they obey him." Now, I'm only a rudimentary biblical scholar, but I found that this verse may have the punctuation in the wrong place. I read it this way, "What is this new teaching? With authority, he even gives orders to evil spirits and they obey!" Am I wrong or can I see fear in the response of the people to Jesus? They don't celebrate his casting out the unclean spirits and thereby restoring the man to an ordinary life. They don't remark about how moving the sermon was.

They ask themselves over and over, "What is this new teaching?" And they remark about the authority he has that doesn't seem to appear anywhere among their leaders. They only know that Jesus brings something new into their lives, and they're not sure it's safe to be around. It seems that they were more afraid of the divine in their midst then the evil that had been with them for some time. Boy, did they get that right!

Jesus called others into ministry with him to do what he did: confront evil. Not many of us are experienced nor comfortable with that notion. Jesus clearly demonstrated in this encounter from Mark that faith has that purpose.

Let me end this with two questions. What unclean spirits which exist in the open, do we, as a church filled with people of faith, leave unconfronted in today's world? Is that what Jesus would have us do?

Recent Events and Upcoming Opportunities

- 1. Thank you for your service: I want to say thanks again to Joanne Arvid and Jerome Noble for their contributions and work on our behalf this past year, and in Joanne's case, past several years. Jerome served as Discipleship Chair, helping to organize our worship activities, and Joanne as Clerk, ably keeping records with minutes of our meetings and acting as an officer of the church. We are fortunate to have had their wise input during many important events and actions.
- 2. Thanks to the volunteers who attended Pride Fest: I am pleased that we had a contingent of folks again at this year's LGBTQ event held at Laishley Park. It is such a worthwhile opportunity for us to become known in the community as an open and affirming congregation.
- 3. Baker Street Children's Clothing: I am asking for a volunteer from the congregation to assist with our annual collection of children's' clothing for the Baker Street Center (daycare) in association with the Punta Gorda Woman's Club. Over the years we have been one of the sponsors to help children in need of play clothes for the spring/summer months at the Center. This leadership opportunity involves only a few hours of work early in the project and then delivering the clothing to the Woman's Club in early March. I have the contact information on hand to pass along to someone who is able to help with this very worthwhile project. You'll enjoy doing this as you meet delightful people in the community and also be invited to a luncheon at the Woman's Club where the children perform songs and model the clothes. It is fun to do and only requires only a once a year commitment!

Goals going forward:

- Plan for the replacement and upgrade the eastern section of the church's roof which leaks badly during the rainy season. This issue has been put on hold for some time and we are approaching a critical situation needing our attention. You will hear more about this matter as the year progresses as we try to come to an agreement to improve this pressing need for our facility.
- 2. Consider upgrades of our very dated air conditioning system with modern wall mounted, energy efficient units. We spend a lot of money cooling the building and could do so with less cost if we upgrade our system. This may be tackled in the coming year or beyond as we find ways to help upgrade our approach to cooling, one of our biggest bills during the summer.
- 3. **Update our website** and provide ways for office staff to keep the information on it more current and timely. By February we hope to have the new site in place and functioning.
- 4. **Complete an in-house, updated Church Directory** by late spring with photos, names, and contact information.

IRS notice has provided that distributions from IRAs that are directly donated to nonprofit organizations (think UCC Church, here) can be made tax free. Typical distributions from IRAs are normally taxed when the withdrawal is made, but direct donations are tax free.

If you had a chance to read the annual report, you will have seen that we ended the year with a loss of around \$3,000. Also, at the annual meeting, the congregation approved an operating budget for next year that projects donations to the operating account of \$171,000 and projected expenses of \$157,689. If all goes well, we will be able to repay some if not all the monies that were borrowed in FY2015 & FY2016 from the Cornerstone Fund.



It is encouraging to have a budget that projects a possible "profit." I am looking forward to seeing the results of our stewardship campaign, "Journey of Generosity," provide the donations that will enable us to meet our goal of \$171,000.

Since we do not have January financial results yet, I am going to close my report with a few "housekeeping" items:

If your check is being mailed by your bank, please check that you have given the bank the post office address rather than the street address and, if the latter, we'd appreciate your instructing your bank to change the mailing address.

 When writing your envelope number in the memo section of your check, please be sure to use your 2018 envelope number.
