- 2. **St. Vincent DePaul Collection Box** is available for your cash and check donations to the food bank. The box is near the wheelbarrow and convenient for you to drop in your contributions. Remember, the cash that you submit goes a lot further than providing a box of cereal or a jar of peanut butter. One dollar donated translates into \$7 worth of goods when SVdP purchases items for their food pantry 7 times the value of our usual food donation. Please consider giving cash as a wonderful option to support this worthy cause. Neoma Remiger will continue to collect the cash donations (and food items) for weekly delivery. Thank you, Neoma, for being our connection to this helpful organization!
- 3. **Baker Street Children's Clothing** collection is now completed. Thank you all once again for a very successful clothing drive! The cute outfits will go to nearly 100 children and help them to have a wonderful summer in their new clothes. Well done, everyone, with a special thanks to Neoma and her team (Marty and Sandy N.) for taking on this annual happy event!

Ongoing Goals and Matters under Consideration:

1. Still working on a plan for the replacement and upgrade of the eastern section of the church's roof which leaks badly during the rainy season. This issue has been on hold for some time but with the rainy season ahead, we are approaching a critical situation needing our attention. The LT is looking into a capital campaign to kick start the project, so stay tuned for more information to come!

2. **Another facilities project will be to complete** upgrades of our very dated air conditioning system with modern wall mounted, energy efficient units. We spend a lot of money cooling the building and could do so with less cost if we upgrade our system. This will be tackled as we find ways to help upgrade our approach to cooling, one of our biggest bills during the summer.

ENDOWMENT TEAM - Bill Ringelstein, Chair

We are happy to report that four distributions have been recommended by the Endowment Team, approved by the Leadership Team and presented at services in March.

On Sunday, March 18, Back Pack Kidz received \$1,800 to assist their project of providing food to school students over the weekends when schools and the cafeterias in the schools are closed. Drug Free Punta Gorda received \$2,500 to assist in providing substance abuse prevention to students.

On Sunday, March 25, the Edgewater Bicycle Ministry received \$1,800 to provide bicycle locks for those receiving free bicycles from the Edgewater ministry. The Early Learning Coalition of Florida's Heartland (ELC) received \$2,000 to provide quality reading material for children who do not have access to literature and to also provide free cook books, How to Eat Well On \$4 A Day, which has numerous recipes for nutritious meals that are both cheap and easy to prepare.

The Endowment Team has a few other worthy applications that will receive due consideration in the weeks ahead. We are grateful for the comments we have received from the congregation and the support shown for the Team.



STEWARDSHIP



As you can see from the chart above, CUCC is staying very close to budget, having generated a surplus of \$2,862 through February. As many of you know, given the seasonal nature of our congregation, we need to generate a surplus in the first four to five months of the year to compensate for the reduced collections when our snowbirds head north.

I want to thank everyone who contributed toward the offering envelopes. By decreasing the number of envelopes that we purchased for 2018 and the contributions that you have made, we have covered almost 100% of the cost of the envelopes.

We have also begun to take in monetary offerings for St. Vincent DePaul, and we have included their most recent thank you letter at the back of the Beacon. This is a wonderful partnership that allows us to give back to our community in a meaningful way.

Writing Right is a Fast-Fading Concept

The young clerk at the office supply store was hunched over her tablet, scribbling out a rain-check for an item the store had run out of. Her ball-point pen, gripped in a clenched fist, dug into the paper as she completed the form.

When I got into the car, I looked at the slip the salesgirl had handed me. How in the world would the folks at the store be able to read the information on the note? The disconnected words and undecipherable instructions gave no clue as to what I wanted to buy.

Driving home, my mind wandered back to that long-ago classroom where I sat with my schoolmates, struggling with the Palmer method of "penmanship." As we practiced, Miss Ingram roamed the aisles, correcting here, encouraging there. She was a stickler for turning her charges into "readable" writers. If, like me, you are "older than dirt," you may remember those endless practice sessions of push-pulls and ovals. The pencil or pen had to be held just right. No gripping allowed. The motion, we were constantly reminded, was to come from our wrist and arm, not our clenched fist. Eventually, our painstaking repetition resulted in sheets of paper filled with sweeping, easily-read letters and words.

It's been many years since I've been in a classroom setting. I'm sure by now the study of penmanship has vanished along with such old-fashioned school supplies as ink bottles, slide rules and carbon paper. Today's school kids use computers for almost everything from composition to data storage. And, to be honest, writers like me seldom write their works in longhand. It's become a computer world out there.

That's why I was surprised not long ago to learn of an event called National Handwriting Day. It is celebrated annually on John Hancock's birthday. The date honors Hancock, the first signer of the Declaration of Independence and an early proponent of good handwriting. According to history, when Hancock took pen in hand for the historic autograph, he signed in lettering so large that the King of England couldn't miss it.

But a signature as well as writing in general has deteriorated markedly since the time of Hancock and his patriot brothers. In fact, even since you and I were in school, the writing we see today has lost much of the readability taught by Miss Ingram and the Palmer method. Not only do today's young people avoid handwriting, but as the generations come along, fewer and fewer will be able to READ handwriting......like copies of the original Declaration of Independence.

What would Miss Ingram and John Hancock say?
